


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### **HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE**

Check the Table of Contents in the front of this Guide for a breakdown of categories. If you still cannot find what you are looking for, consult the Index at the back of the Guide.


### About This Guide

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
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
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
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














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### A Caregiver's Checklist for Planning Ahead

People over the age of 85 are the fastest growing segment of our population. Well over half of the US adult population either is or expects to be a family caregiver. Planning ahead for the possibility of caregiving, making decisions ahead of time, locating resources, and having open discussions with family members can help alleviate potential problems. Listed below are a few things to carefully consider when getting affairs in order before a disaster or medical emergency arises.

### **General Questions**

- ✓ Who will be the primary caregiver?
- ✓ How will other family members be involved?
- ✓ Which responsibilities can be shared? How?

### **Financial and Legal questions**

- ✓ Do you know the bank accounts, account numbers, and types of accounts of your loved one?
- ✓ Do you know what assets your loved one has, their value and locations?
- ✓ Where are deeds and titles to all property?
- ✓ Do you know all insurance information? Company name(s), policy number(s), beneficiary as stated on the policies and the type of insurance owned? (health, life, long term care, automobile, etc)
- ✓ What is the social security amount? Is it directly deposited? Where?
- ✓ Where are social security and Medicare cards located?
- ✓ What are the debts? Mortgages, car payments?
- ✓ Does your loved one have an updated will, a power of attorney, a durable power of attorney? Where are these documents?
- ✓ Has an Advanced Directive been prepared and given to the primary physician and any relatives who may need this?

### **Physical condition questions**

- ✓ Has your loved one had a recent physical? A geriatric assessment?
- ✓ What medications are being taken? Prescription? Over the counter?
- ✓ Do you need to consult with your loved one's pharmacist and doctor to see if any medications cause interactions or should be avoided?

### **Housing questions**

- ✓ Can your loved one live alone?
- ✓ What housing options are acceptable to your loved one and family? Is a nursing facility or assisted living facility needed? Is your loved one on waiting lists for these facilities if they are (or soon will be) needed?
- ✓ Is senior housing an option?

### **End of life questions**


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- ✓ What are your loved ones wishes for funeral and burial arrangements?
- ✓ Have any arrangements already been secured? What is the name and location of the funeral home?

### **CAREGIVER TIP**

The following are home safety tips for persons caring for someone with Alzheimer's Disease:

- Install secure locks on all outside windows and doors, especially if the person is prone to wandering.
   Remove the locks on bathroom doors to prevent the person from accidentally locking himself or herself in.
- Use childproof latches on kitchen cabinets and anyplace where cleaning supplies or other chemicals are kept.
- Label medications and keep them locked up. Also make sure knives, lighters and matches, and guns are secured and out of reach
- Keep the house free from clutter. Remove scatter rugs and anything else that might contribute to a fall. Make sure lighting is good both inside and out
- Be alert to and address kitchen-safety issues, such as the person forgetting to turn off the stove after cooking. Consider installing an automatic shut-off switch on the stove to prevent burns or fire.

### 10 Tips for Family Caregivers

- Caregiving is a job and respite is your earned right. Reward yourself with respite breaks often.
- 2. Watch out for signs of depression, and don't delay in getting professional help when you need it.
- 3. When people offer to help, **accept the offer** and suggest specific things that they can do.
- Educate yourself about your loved one's condition and how to communicate effectively with doctors.
- 5. There's a difference between caring and doing. **Be open** to technologies and ideas that promote your loved one's independence.
- 6. **Trust your instincts.** Most of the time they'll lead you in the right direction.
- 7. Caregivers often do a lot of lifting, pushing, and pulling. **Be good to your back.**
- 8. Grieve for your losses, and then allow yourself to **dream new dreams.**
- 9. **Seek support** from other caregivers. There is great strength in knowing you are not alone.
- 10. **Stand up for your rights** as a caregiver and a citizen.

### **Glossary of Terms**

### Alzheimer's Disease

Alzheimer's (A.D.) is a form of dementia that is a progressive, degenerative and incurable disease that attacks brain cells, resulting in impaired memory, thinking and behavior. It is not a natural consequence of aging.

### **Congregate Meal Sites**

Most centers also serve as group meal locations. This program is funded by the Older Americans Act (OAA). It is intended for persons 60 years of age or older to have one nutritionally balanced meal on weekdays. Advance meal order reservations are required by each center. OAA Congregate Meal Programs encourage a monetary donation. Others charge fees which are adjustable according to ability to pay. Some Congregate Meals or nutrition sites are also in senior apartments, churches, temples or community centers. Transportation to these meal programs is often available.

### Dementia

Dementia is the loss of intellectual functions (such as memory deficit or confusion) that interfere with daily living. Many conditions cause or mimic dementia, including depression, tumors, drug reactions, nutritional deficiencies and degenerative physiological diseases. Geriatric assessment can help determine cause and suggest treatment that may improve or reverse behavior patterns.

### Home Delivered Meals/Meals on Wheels

Persons age 60+ who are homebound, need help preparing complete meals and have no other means of obtaining a complete meal can request home delivery. The hot meal is balanced to provide one-third of the daily recommended requirements and many programs also deliver a second daily brown bag supplemental meal. Some special dietary restrictions such as low cholesterol, diabetic and low salt are followed. **Drivers for these programs also provide some monitoring of the homebound person.** Home Delivered Meals are funded by sources including federal funding from Title III C-2 of the Older Americans Act. Some programs operate on donations. Others set fixed fees for meals and delivery.

### ICDS – Integrated Care Delivery System:

A system of comprehensive service management of the full continuum of Medicare and Medicaid benefits, including long-term services and supports, for Medicare-Medicaid Enrollees.

### **Senior Centers**

Centers are places where older adults can gather and make new friends. While programs vary by center, most offer social and nutritional outreach programs, health screenings and counseling, and a variety of educational, fitness and volunteer programs. Some centers may charge a small annual membership fee.

### TRANSPORTATION TERMS

### Curb to curb

Requires a rider to be able to walk from house to curb to enter vehicle.

### Home to door

Service assists or carries the rider from the home to the vehicle and through the door of the destination. A person in need of this service should call and confirm distance to be carried, number of steps and allowable weight.

### **Escort Service**

A person accompanies an older adult or a small group who need assistance getting to and from medical appointments, shopping or banking.

### **ESTATE PLANNING TERMS**

### **Conservatorship or Guardianship**

Court appointed person who makes legal and/or financial decisions for a person (ward) who is unable to manage his/her own affairs and/or property. There are strict court procedures for supervising and maintaining conservatorship and guardianship.

### **Joint Tenancy**

Two or more people (such as a couple) own or hold title to an asset with right of survivorship. If held with right of survivorship, probate is avoided until the death of the last joint tenant/spouse. There are pros and cons of joint tenancy which should be discussed with an attorney.

### **Probate**

Court proceeding which arranges for resolution of all legal and financial matters of the deceased. Title and asset changes are made according to the wishes in a valid will, or according to state directives in the absence of a will. Probate takes an average of nine to 24 months. Fees include attorneys, court, asset appraisals and sometimes bond premiums (5–15 % of estate value). Information is public record. Probate proceedings are required in every state in which property is owned. Ways to avoid probate include joint ownership of all assets such as bank accounts, IRA's, life insurance and house. These will all go into probate, however, upon the death of the second spouse.



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### **Revocable Living Trust**

A planning tool that takes the place of a will and avoids probate. Transfers assets to a trust that is administered by a named trustee, which could be yourself. Allows you to pass certain assets to children tax free, and to designate who will receive your assets and who will manage and distribute them after your death or disability. A successor trustee will assume management without need for a legal guardianship. It can be changed or revoked at any time.

### **Unlimited Marital Deduction**

No estate taxes are imposed on surviving spouse regardless of size of estate. However, estate tax is imposed at the time of death of the surviving spouse if the estate exceeds a certain amount.

### Will

A legal document which declares how you want your assets distributed after your death.

### HOME HEALTH CARE TERMS

### Care Coordination/Case Management

Professional social worker or nurse makes in-home assessment and determines individual plan of care. Makes sure that care is achieving its purpose towards client safety and recovery.

### **Clinical Nurse Specialists**

Have extensive training in a subspecialty such as geropsych or ET or IV therapy. Specialists train family members to help provide care for the patient.

### **Discharge Planner**

Works with patients and family at hospital discharge to guide in decisions for nursing home placement, home health care, rehabilitation, therapies, etc.

### **Hi-tech Specialty Nursing**

Includes home transfusion therapies, central line, porta catheters and dialysis services.

### **Home Health Aide (Personal Care)**

Assistance with personal care such as bathing, dressing, walking, etc. Generally not covered by insurances.

### **Home Health Care**

These agencies offer a range of services that allow you to remain at home with some assistance in daily living, whether medical, personal hygiene, companionship, rehabilitation and support to aid the healing process after illness, surgery, or injury. If you need several services, a medical social worker will visit you in your home to determine what services you need and will help you arrange for them.

### **Home Infusion Therapies**

Enteral (ET): Nutritional tube feedings through stomach

Paraenteral (TPN): Venous nutritional feedings IV: Venous medication delivery

### **Homemaker Services**

Assist with light housekeeping, meal planning and preparation, laundry, eliminate safety hazards, accompany to appointments, running errands and grocery shopping. Generally not covered by insurances.

### **Medical Social Work**

Licensed Social Worker consults with patient and family, making referrals for chronic medical problems and to available community resources.

### **Occupational Therapy**

Includes exercises, adaptive equipment, splinting, joint protection, energy conservation.

### **Skilled Care**

Care provided by a registered nurse such as injections and medication administration; occupational, physical, or speech therapy; and social work services. Generally covered through Medicare, Medicaid or other insurances.

### SENIOR HOUSING TERMS

### **Adult Day Services or Day Treatment**

Daytime attendance, care, activities and services are a bridge, in some cases, for persons who wish to remain in their own homes but need assistance in personal care and can no longer cook for themselves. Can also provide respite for families and serve as an "outing" for persons seldom able to leave home.

### **Adult Foster Home**

A residence certified by the Central Ohio Area Agency on Aging that provides accommodations, supervision and personal care services (bathing, grooming, dressing, feeding, medication reminders, etc.) for one or two adults unrelated to the owner of the residence.

### Adult Care Facility (ACF)

Adult Family Home (three to five unrelated adults) Adult Group Home (six to 16 unrelated adults)

Licensed by the Ohio Department of Health to provide accommodations and 24-hour supervision for three to 16 adults unrelated to the owner(s), at least three of whom are provided personal care. Typically facilities provide a room, three meals a day and limited personal help such as bathing, dressing and getting in and out of bed. Costs and quality of care vary widely.





### **Assisted Living**

A marketing term used by facilities that may combine apartment-style living with supportive services designed to help older adults live in an independent setting for as long as possible. Facilities may be licensed as Residential Care Facilities by the Ohio Dept. of Health. Units may include private bedroom, cooking area, bathroom, locked doors and individual temperature controls. Supportive services may include housekeeping, personal care, routine nursing services (meds, special diets, dressings), service coordination and health monitoring.

### **Assisted Living Waiver**

A statewide program open to adults who are financially eligible for Medicaid and determined by COAAA to need a "Nursing facility level of care," the same requirements as for the PASSPORT program. The program pays the costs of care in an Assisted Living facility. The consumer is responsible for "room and board" expenses. Eligible consumers can select from any participating licensed assisted living provider. Those interested in participating in the waiver may call COAAA at (614) 645-7250 or 1-800-589-7277.

### Congregate Living

Independent rental housing in which meals are served in a congregate setting and housekeeping, laundry and transportation may be provided, but not supervision of personal care.

### **Continuing Care Retirement Communities (CCRC's)**

Accredited to offer living arrangements from independent to skilled nursing. CCRCs may require the payment of an entrance or endowment fee in exchange for a promise of continuing care to the resident for a prescribed period, usually the life of the resident. CCRCs will arrange for nursing care or provide it on site. Some fees are partially refundable according to pre-arranged published terms.

### **Extended Care/Subacute Care Hospital Rooms**

Some hospitals offer private rooms on a temporary basis for those who cannot go home, but do not want to move into a continuing care facility.

### **Hospice Care**

For those who have a terminal illness and require 24-hr. care. These programs address the medical, emotional and spiritual needs of both the patient and families.

### Independent Living

Broad term encompassing many types of housing options meaning that a person maintains own living area and attends to personal care needs.

### **Intermediate Nursing Care**

Persons with chronic disabilities or illness, who require more than the services offered by retirement homes, assisted living or home health may benefit from this option. This service provides 24-hour care for someone who cannot manage to live independently at home. Intermediate care facilities certified by Medicare/Medicaid provide daily activities, social programs, and dining facilities under the supervision of a licensed dietician, as well as housekeeping, linen and laundry service. Some facilities have beauty/barber shops and other amenities.

# Nursing Facilities (Nursing Homes), Skilled Nursing Facility or Health Care Center

A 24-hour nursing care and rehabilitation center that meets federal regulations for Medicare and/or Medicaid. Care is supervised by a nurse under the direction of a physician medical director. Includes dietary, pharmaceutical and social activities services. All licensing/certification reports are available for public inspection. Reports list any deficiencies or corrections needed.

### Rehabilitation/Skilled Nursing

This care is often a necessary step between the hospital and home. Your physician will help you decide when your level of recovery is such that you no longer need acute care in a hospital, but continue to need rehabilitation therapy and/or skilled nursing care. Your physician will send comprehensive continuity of care, medication and therapy orders to the nursing facility. Your physician and healthcare team will help you determine goals to help you return home. Additionally, a plan of care will be developed to take care of your needs at home. Your nursing facility discharge planner will help you arrange for home health, Meals on Wheels, and/or other services that may be required.

### Residential Care Facilities (Rest Homes)

Licensed by the Ohio Department of Health to provide accommodations for 17 or more adults unrelated to the housing owner(s), to provide supervision and personal care services (bathing, grooming, dressing, feeding, medication reminders, etc.) for at least 3 residents and supervise special diets or medications to at least 1 resident.

### TAKE NOTE

### **Respite Care**

Short-term stay in a nursing facility to allow the family/caregiver some rest. Sometimes, this time away from home allows the care recipient an opportunity to socialize, participate in mentally stimulating recreational activities and to make new friends.

### **Retirement Community**

Housing for older adults with organized amenities such as transportation and social activities. On-site meals, banking, health screenings, pharmacy and sundry shopping may be available. All require monthly rental fees with varying lease terms, security deposits and rental agreements. There are profit and not-for-profit facilities.

### Seniors Apartment Building

Some apartments rent only to those over a certain age. In some cases, units have been equipped with amenities and provide some services to specifically benefit older adults.

### **Sub-acute Care**

This is a term for care which requires extensive nursing but not direct physician care. Patients do not need the full range of hospital services but do need between four to seven hours of skilled nursing care and/or additional therapy services. Emphasis is on rehabilitation and stays typically do not last beyond a few months. Some examples of common sub-acute cases include brain and spinal cord injuries, infusion therapies, respiratory problems, cancer, stroke, AIDS and head trauma. The necessity to reduce health care costs is why this new level of care is offered through hospitals, nursing homes and rehabilitative facilities.

### **Subsidized Apartments**

If persons meet low income qualifications, government programs will pay additional housing costs that exceed 30-35% of income. There may be very long waiting lists in some areas.

### **LEGAL TERMS**

See also Finances and Medical Insurance.

### **Advance Directives**

Allows you to express wishes in advance to let physicians and others know what medical treatments are acceptable in the event of terminal illness or temporary incapacity. The Living Will directive supercedes the Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care. Advance planning is extremely important for these complex decisions. You may want to consult with an attorney.

### Conservatorship

Created voluntarily at the request of a physically infirm, but competent, adult to place his property or person under court supervised care.

### **Durable General Power of Attorney**

Gives power to another to make legal or financial decisions such as check cashing, banking needs, filling out tax forms, etc., if you are unable to do so. The powers can be narrow or broad. You should be carefeul when using a form to assign power of attorney because many are often flawed and not legally binding.

### **Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care**

Gives power to another to make medical decisions if you are unable to do so. It should be used along with a Living Will. Living Wills are limited to life and death medical care. It is an important companion document. A form can be obtained from the State Bar Association.

### **Living Trust**

Allows you to transfer ownership of property and assets to a trust which is administered by someone you appoint, including yourself. There are both changeable and non-changeable (revocable and irrevocable) trusts, each of which have differing effects on taxes and government benefits.

### **Medicaid Trust**

A legal document that protects assets if you are confined to a nursing home and will apply for Medicaid.

### Residents' Rights

Should be prominently posted, entitling residents to the highest quality of care with dignity, respect, full information about fees, charges and the right to privacy.

### **Representative Payee**

The person designated by the Social Security or Veterans' Administration to receive a benefit check on behalf of another person. For example, a check for James Smith is paid to Lucy Jones. (Lucy Jones must be able to provide a full accounting of her use of the money on behalf of James Smith if requested to do so.) The designation may be altered by requesting a change at the SSA or VA office.

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### **Helpful Questions to Ask**

### HOME HEALTH CARE QUESTIONS

- ☑ What services do we need? What will they cost, per visit or per hour, including overtime or holiday charges? How are charges calculated? Is there a minimum number of hours or days per week? What happens when our insurance and/or Medicare runs out?
- ☑ How is the agency accredited and is it Medicare and/or Medicaid certified?
- ✓ Will the same person be reliable, dependable and available throughout all care? Is there a nursing supervisor who oversees all care and will help address any questions or problems?
- ✓ Does the agency screen and bond all caregivers and guarantee that its workers are protected with written personnel policies and benefits such as social security, liability, malpractice insurance and worker's comp?
- ☑ Are regular physicals and TB screening required for all workers? Do providers have CPR certification?
- ✓ Will the agency consult with our physician and family to develop a written care plan with specific duties caregivers are to perform, at what intervals and for how long? Will necessary personnel know what our needs are?
- ✓ Does the agency have 24 hours/day, 7 days/week service in case of emergencies?
- ✓ Will the agency teach caregivers the health care skills so the patient can work towards regaining independence?
- How long has the agency been in business? Is it affiliated with any hospital, community or social service agency?
- ☑ How often will we be billed and who will we pay? Is third party reimbursement available? Will the agency file Medicare, Medicaid, HMO and private insurance claims?

### HOSPICE QUESTIONS

- ✓ What's the response to your very first call?
- ☑ If hospital care is needed, does the patient have choice of hospital and physician?

- ✓ What will the actual out-of-pocket costs be?
- ☑ How long will it take to begin hospice service?
- ✓ How often does someone visit?
- ✓ Does the patient need 24-hour care?
- ☑ What services and how many hours are provided?
- What relationship does your doctor have with the provider?
- ✓ What is the average caseload carried by each nurse?
- ☑ Will inpatient care be provided in a designated hospice unit?
- What happens if the patient no longer needs in-hospital care but cannot go home?
- ☑ What nursing homes are under contract with the hospice provider?
- ☑ Will the same team stay with the patient throughout the entire length of care?
- ☑ How often will a home health aide visit if your patient has intensive physical care needs?
- ☑ Are there any special services or therapies offered which meet your patient's specific needs and wishes?
- ✓ Will someone be with the family at the time of death?
- ☑ What long term bereavement family support is available?
- ☑ What happens if Medicare or private insurance coverage ends?
- Will the hospice service file insurance claims for the family? How will out-of-pocket expenses be handled?
- Who can be called after normal business hours and how fast do they respond?
- How long has the hospice service been in business in the area and is it affiliated with any hospital, community or social service agency?

- Repair and maintenance?
- · Home modification?
- · Personal care assistance?
- Nursing care?

- · Emergency assistance and security?
- · Laundry and housekeeping service?

- Good food and a selection of food?
- Transportation, shopping and preferred worship services?
- My preferred diet and have in-room tray service if I decide I'm not feeling well?
- My own phone? And be able to have my family and friends visit when I like?

- Insurance billing help?

- Feel comfortable with the religious affiliation and planned services?
- Understand all room costs and additional fees?
- Feel secure about the financial stability of the owners/management?

### IMPORTANT!

Many people have lawyers establish trusts but do not move assets into them. All assets passed via a will must first pass through probate. Assets placed in a trust are not subject to probate. Make sure to make provisions to fund your trust. Before assets have been spent down, make sure you purchase a funeral insurance plan.

### NURSING FACILITY QUESTIONS

- ☑ Does the facility provide the skilled services you need?
- ✓ Does the facility have planned group activities such as bingo, pet therapy, trips, celebrations, etc.?
- ✓ Is the facility Medicare/Medicaid certified?
- ☑ What happens if your money runs out and you rely on Medicaid for payment?
- ☑ Are Medicaid beds available? If not, how long is the waiting period?
- Are location and visiting times convenient for family and friends?
- ☑ What is your first impression about the odor, cleanliness, decor and atmosphere?
- ✓ Do residents appear to enjoy the staff and do staff members know the residents by name?
- How responsive are the staff to your and your loved one's requests?
- ☑ Can roommates be changed easily if requested?
- Is the philosophical or religious orientation of the facility compatible with yours?
- ✓ What are the staffing ratios?
- ✓ What personal items may be retained to provide a satisfactory level of familiarity and comfort?
- ☑ Are residents mostly well-groomed and out of bed?
- How are the costs calculated, including single vs. double occupancy, laundry, therapy, activities, special diets, medical supplies, telephone and television?

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### **TAKE NOTE**

You're not alone! You don't have to miss work to care for an elderly relative. Your local Area Agency on Aging or Senior Center can help you find providers and services including meals, transportation, homemaker and chore services and adult day supervision. Also ask if Eldercare benefits programs are available through your employer.

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### **AREA AGENCIES ON AGING**

An Area Agency on Aging is a public or private non-profit agency, designated by the state to address the needs and concerns of all older adults at the local level. An Area Agency on Aging is a generic term. These agencies can provide information on services in their locale, as well as other specific activities related to their state. In general, all Area Agencies provide three primary services for Americans age 60+:

- Advocate for all older Americans within their service area.
- Identify the needs of the elderly in their areas and create multi-year plans for the development of comprehensive, community-based services to meet those needs.
- Administer Older Americans Act funds and other funds to implement the plan.





### Primary Resource Information & Referral Agencies

These primary resource agencies for older adults provide information about local services and resources available for seniors. All either provide or refer for advocacy and counseling, health screenings, emergency help, wellness programs, meals, outreach, social activities and transportation.



### O Doctor Visit Checklist: Be Prepared!

It's common for most people to forget what they want to ask their doctor, or they think their doctor is too busy to spend extra time with them. Remember, this is scheduled time with the doctor. And you're entitled to answers to your questions. In order to make the most of your visit to the doctor, it's important to be prepared. Use this helpful checklist to prepare for your next doctor visit.

# Prior to a Doctor Visit (take this information with you):

- 1. Write down your questions.
- 2. Write down any changes in your symptoms or condition.
- Take a copy of your prescription formulary list you can find it in your insurance company enrollment packet or at your insurance carrier's website.
- Write down alternative treatments or medications that you'd like to discuss with your physician.
- 5. Make a list of the current medications you're taking (over the counter and prescriptions).
- 6. Other:

### **During Your Doctor Visit:**

- If your doctor prescribes a name brand medication, ask about a generic equivalent. Doing so may help you save on out-of-pocket costs.
- Ask if the prescribed medication is on your formulary list (give your doctor a copy). Using medications on the list can help you save on out-of-pocket costs. Visit your insurance carrier's webiste to print out a copy of the formulary list.
- 3. Ask your doctor for samples of the medication he/she prescribed. This way you can try the medication for a few days to see if it's effective for you. If it is, then you can fill your doctor's prescription; if not, it hasn't cost you anything.
- 4. Be sure to review the list of symptoms, questions and medications that you've prepared.
- When appropriate, talk to your doctor about other treatment options. Make sure you're well informed. Discuss which treatment would be most beneficial and cost-effective for you.



### A Guide for Selecting the Right Product

A key to remember is to assess the specifics of your situation so that you match the product to the "individual's situation." This is called "individual-centered care." Below is an Assessment Guide to help you through the process. Critical elements to consider are: a) type of incontinence: urinary and/or bowel; b) mobility (it's about ease of "getting around"); c) mental alertness; d) caregiver availability. The following "scoring tool" will help in selecting the right style and absorbency level.

### CARING FOR GOOD NUTRITION

### Make dining a pleasure and reap the nutrition benefits by implementing the following:

- Create a relaxed environment during mealtimes.
  - Keep the pace leisurely and the conversation pleasant.
  - Don't dwell if one refuses to eat.
- If weight loss or minimal appetite are concerns,
  - Offer smaller portions and more frequent meals or snacks. For example, serve six small meals per day, rather than 3 meals per day.
  - Provide a variety of high calorie, nutrient rich foods, such as cream of vegetable soup with powdered milk added, mashed potatoes with butter and whole milk, creamed spinach, or apples with peanut butter and honey.
  - Consider providing an instant breakfast drink made with milk as a snack.
- Serve a variety of nutritious, comfort foods.
- ❖ If your loved one has difficulty using utensils, be flexible and offer finger foods. Some examples are diced vegetables, bite size chicken, cheese cubes.
- If your loved one has swallowing problems, slightly thickened liquids may help. Examples are vegetable juice and fruit nectars. Please seek medical advice for further evaluation and food texture modifications.
- Ensure water and other fluids are available all day. Include juices, broth, gelatin, ice pops, decaffeinated coffee or tea.

As a Caregiver, don't forget to take care of your own nutritional needs.

#### Methods of Transport:

#### **Ambulance**

Request this mode of transportation if:

- Emergency response is required
- For any reason the patient cannot safely be transported by other means (therefore meeting medical necessity requirements).
- Requiring any care or monitoring in route to destination.

#### Stretcher Van

Request this mode of transportation if the patient:

- Must remain supine or in laying position during transport
- Must not require any care or monitoring during transport.

#### **Paralift**

Request this mode of transportation if:

- Patient can safely remain seated in a wheelchair during transport and is not at risk of wandering.
- Patient cannot require any care of monitoring during the transport. (See note below.)

#### Vai

Request this mode of transportation if:

- · Patient needs no assistance and is ambulatory.
- Patient must not require any care or monitoring during transport. (See note below.)

**Note:** If the patient has an oxygen tank and is able to self administer the oxygen, this form of transport is acceptable. If not, use an ambulance.

When researchers compared a commonly used four-legged, two-wheeled walker with a newer three-legged, three-wheeled walker, the three-wheeler came out ahead in terms of patient satisfaction.

#### TAKE NOTE

#### Living Trusts vs. Wills

The Federal Government allows individuals and couples to pass some or all of their estate to their heirs tax free. This can be accomplished with a professionally prepared will or a living trust – depending on the circumstances.

Living trusts can be an effective estate planning tool but they are not needed by everyone. Funding a trust means transferring assets such as your home, car or bank accounts into the legal entity (trust) from your own name. Assets then are owned by the trust – not yourself. You or someone you designate then administers the trust as the trustee. If you name yourself as trustee, you still retain total control of those assets in the trust.

Unlike a will, the use of which alone still requires probate at death, a living trust is executed during a person's lifetime. You can administer your own trust, and upon your death or incapacitation, a named successor trustee will assume management. This prevents probate and/or the need to apply for guardianship or conservatorship. There are both changeable and non-changeable (revocable and non-revocable) trusts, each of which have differing effects on taxes and government benefits.

Any tax deferred accounts, such as an IRA or 401(k), should not be placed in trust. The IRS considers this a taxable distribution and will charge you taxes and a penalty.

#### **Considerations:**

Living Trust

#### Simple Will

- Can distribute my estate according to my wishes.
- A living trust allows for effective tax planning strategies with the maximum level of control.
- Avoid probate and/or attorney fees associated with probate.
- Probate is expensive and slow.
   Files are open to the public.
   Wills can be challenged by heirs who are legally entitled to notice of distribution.
- No cut-off for creditors to file claims.
- Avoids probate in each state in which property is owned.
- A named successor trustee assumes management upon your incapacitation without the need to petition the court to name a conservator to act for you.
- If your life insurance policy is owned by the trust, and your estate is worth more than the allowable limit, the trust will have to pay taxes on the proceeds.
- Guardianship is avoided in the event of incapacity.
- Generally simpler and less time consuming than probate.

- Can effectively accomplish the same with joint ownership and designation within a will.
- There are many strategies which can be used to reduce or eliminate federal and state taxes with or without a living trust.
- You can hold property in joint names or Payable at Death accounts. Assets with named beneficiaries also avoid probate.
- It depends on the complexity of your estate. Trust administration can also be expensive, slow, and complex. Very few people actually go to court to read files.
- No claims can be filed after one year.
- Your will must be validated by the probate court in each state in which you own property.
- Provides a safeguard against a dishonest heir or trustee.
   Probate court requires strict accounting and closely supervises estate administration.
- Life insurance proceeds are not taxable to an individual while that individual is living.
- A Durable Power of Attorney can accomplish the same thing in most cases without incurring the expense of setting up a Living Trust or having to fund it.







#### TAKE NOTE

When originating a General Power of Attorney make sure there is a clause specifically stating that a copy is as good as the original notarized one. Make copies and send one to each financial institution well in advance of when you'll need to execute it. Some have their own form and will not accept yours (even though it has been drafted by an attorney). You will still need the original for some financial settlements such as closing on the sale of a house.

#### **Living Will**

(See pages 49–54 for forms) A Living Will tells doctors what to do when you are too sick to communicate. It can indicate when medical treatment should stop, or whether you want passive feeding to be withdrawn. The directives are limited only to care which artificially or technologically postpones death—not comfort care. The Living Will must be signed by you, witnessed by a notary or two non-related adults, excluding your physician and nursing home advisor (a nursing home employee may be a witness). At the time of determination, your attending and one additional physician must certify terminal condition or permanently unconscious state.

#### Of Special Note

- If you want food and water withheld if you are in a permanently unconscious state, you must indicate this by both checking a box on the form and initialing.
- A Living Will supersedes a Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care with respect to life sustaining care decisions.
- ☑ An oral request to your physician, family member or health care worker revokes the signed document.

- Health care providers are required to inform you of your right to refuse or accept medical treatment. Always ask up front what the provider's policy is in honoring advance directives.
- A Living Will applies only to situations of terminal illness and permanent unconsciousness—not to those who have Alzheimer's, had strokes, degenerative disorders or conditions that are not immediately life threatening.

#### **Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care**

Everyone should have one! A Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care appoints a person to make medical decisions for you in situations that your Living Will did not anticipate such as mental or physical incompetency. **To obtain forms**, call

## Funeral Preplanning

Not a favorite topic, but absolutely essential in total estate planning. There are over 50 decisions which need to be made at the time of death. Decisions about the funeral director's services, including length of visitation, type and locations of religious services, securing the clergy, the eulogy, flowers, escort, selecting memorial cards and card verses and writing and placement of a newspaper obituary. Choices of burial vault, casket, cemetery plot, cemetery marker, urn embalming and restorative or cosmetic services must also be selected. Disposition of the physical body involves decisions about organ and/or body donation, burial or cremation.

The average funeral cost is \$5,500. Average cemetery costs range from \$1,800 to \$5,000. By preplanning, you determine what your costs will be by making decisions about plot, vault, marker, interment or mausoleum space.

Both prepaid funeral and cemetery contracts should be made to ensure peace of mind and the honoring of one's wishes. A burial insurance plan should be prepurchased before a family member begins to spend down assets in a skilled nursing center.

There are several prefunding options available including an insurance policy which guarantees that all costs of the services and funeral items that you purchase will be paid for at the time of death. All policies have built-in inflation clauses to cover the costs of those items at the time of death. Check with your funeral director on what items are guaranteed and what is the best plan for you. You can pre-plan without having to pre-fund.

# State of Ohio Living Will Declaration Notice to Declarant

The purpose of this Living Will Declaration is to document your wish that life-sustaining treatment, including artificially or technologically supplied nutrition and hydration, be withheld or withdrawn if you are unable to make informed medical decisions <u>and</u> are in a terminal condition or in a permanently unconscious state. This Living Will Declaration does not affect the responsibility of health care personnel to provide comfort care to you. Comfort care means any measure taken to diminish pain or discomfort, but not to postpone death.

If you would <u>not</u> choose to limit any or all forms of life-sustaining treatment, including CPR, you have the legal right to so choose and may wish to state your medical treatment preferences in writing in a different document.

Under Ohio law, a Living Will Declaration is applicable only to individuals in a terminal condition or a permanently unconscious state. If you wish to direct medical treatment in other circumstances, you should prepare a Health Care Power of Attorney. If you are in a terminal condition or a permanently unconscious state, this Living Will Declaration controls over a Health Care Power of Attorney.

You should consider completing a new Living Will Declaration if your medical condition changes, or if you later decide to complete a Health Care Power of Attorney. If you have both documents, you should keep copies of both documents together, with your other important papers, and bring copies of both your Living Will and your Health Care Power of Attorney with you whenever you are a patient in a health care facility.

## State of Ohio Living Will Declaration of

(Print Full Name)

I state that this is my Ohio Living Will Declaration. I am of sound mind and not under or subject to duress, fraud or undue influence. I am a competent adult who understands and accepts the consequences of this action. I voluntarily declare my wish that my dying not be artificially prolonged. If I am unable to give directions regarding the use of life-sustaining treatment when I am in a terminal condition or a permanently unconscious state, I intend that this Living Will Declaration be honored by my family and physicians as the final expression of my legal right to refuse health care.

**Definitions.** Several legal and medical terms are used in this document. For convenience they are explained below.

Anatomical gift means a donation of all or part of a human body to take effect upon or after death.

Artificially or technologically supplied nutrition or hydration means the providing of food and fluids through intravenous or tube "feedings."

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation or CPR means treatment to try to restart breathing or heartbeat. CPR may be done by breathing into the mouth, pushing on the chest, putting a tube through the mouth or nose into the throat, administering medication, giving electric shock to the chest, or by other means.

**Declarant** means the person signing this document.

**Donor Registry Enrollment Form** means a form that has been designed to allow individuals to specifically register their wishes regarding organ, tissue and eye donation with the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles Donor Registry.

**Do Not Resuscitate** or **DNR Order** means a medical order given by my physician and written in my medical records that cardiopulmonary resuscitation or CPR is not to be administered to me.

**Health care** means any medical (including dental, nursing, psychological, and surgical) procedure, treatment, intervention or other measure used to maintain, diagnose or treat any physical or mental condition.

Health Care Power of Attorney means another document that allows me to name an adult person to act as my agent to make health care decisions for me if I become unable to do so.

**Life-sustaining treatment** means any health care, including artificially or technologically supplied nutrition and hydration, that will serve mainly to prolong the process of dying.

**Living Will Declaration** or **Living Will** means this document that lets me specify the health care I want to receive if I become terminally ill or permanently unconscious and cannot make my wishes known.

**Permanently unconscious state** means an irreversible condition in which I am permanently unaware of myself and my surroundings. My physician and one other physician must examine me and agree that the total loss of higher brain function has left me unable to feel pain or suffering.

**Terminal condition** or **terminal illness** means an irreversible, incurable and untreatable condition caused by disease, illness or injury. My physician and one other physician will have examined me and believe that I cannot recover and that death is likely to occur within a relatively short time if I do not receive life-sustaining treatment.

[Instructions and other information to assist in completing this document are set forth within brackets and in italic type.]

**Health Care if I Am in a Terminal Condition.** If I am in a terminal condition and unable to make my own health care decisions, I direct that my physician shall:

- Administer no life-sustaining treatment, including CPR and artificially or technologically supplied nutrition or hydration; and
- 2. Withdraw such treatment, including CPR, if such treatment has started; and
- 3. Issue a DNR Order; and
- 4. Permit me to die naturally and take no action to postpone my death, providing me with only that care necessary to make me comfortable and to relieve my pain.

Health Care if I Am in a Permanently Unconscious State. If I am in a permanently unconscious state, I direct that my physician shall:

- Administer no life-sustaining treatment, including CPR, except for the provision
  of artificially or technologically supplied nutrition or hydration unless, in the
  following paragraph, I have authorized its withholding or withdrawal; and
- 2. Withdraw such treatment, including CPR, if such treatment has started; and
- 3. Issue a DNR Order; and
- 4. Permit me to die naturally and take no action to postpone my death, providing me with only that care necessary to make me comfortable and to relieve my pain.

#### **GRANDPARENT SUPPORT**

A grandchild raised by a grandparent in Ohio is eligible for monthly benefits in Medicaid funds and for Kinship Care assistance. With Kinship Care, a grandparent can choose one of two programs. The programs offer cash assistance, including child care. Income limitations apply.

A grandparent's legal and financial rights vary by type of custody. Adoption, a foster care license and limited or full guardianship provide different rights. For example, a grandparent might need official custody such as guardianship to obtain medical information. Birth parents still have some rights, including visitation.

Kinship Care refers to a temporary or permanent arrangement in which a relative or any non-relative adult who has a long-standing relationship or bond with the child has taken over the full-time substitute care of a child whose parents are unable or unwilling to do so.

**Kinship Services** can include: Financial assistance, information on public benefits, referral to medical and legal services, respite care, support groups and day camps.

Kinship Permanency Incentive Program (KPI) - Kinship families who obtained legal custody or guardianship of a child on or after July 1, 2005 may be eligible to receive a cash payment in 6 payments over a 36 month period. The amount varies each year. Benefits are available on a first come, first served basis. KPI is a state initiative and families can apply through their county Department of Job and Family Services. In Franklin County, families should contact Franklin Co. Children's Services at (614) 341-6035.



#### **Geriatric Medical Specialists**

Specialists in unique problems of the elderly including memory loss, incontinence and falling.

#### **Related Health Care & Prevention Professionals**

Physical therapists, nutritional and occupational therapists and counselors who offer specific disease support and diagnostic lab tests including x-rays and vision and hearing evaluations.

#### **GERIATRIC CARE MANAGERS**

A geriatric care manager (PGCM) is a professional, such as a social worker, counselor, nurse, or gerontologist who specializes in assisting older people and their families attain the highest quality of life given their circumstances.





#### How a Geriatric Care Manager Can Help

- Conduct care planning assessments to identify problems and provide solutions.
- Screen, arrange and monitor in-home or other services.
- · Provide crisis intervention.
- · Offer counseling and support.
- Assist with moving an older person to or from a retirement complex, assisted care home, or nursing home.
- Review financial, legal, or medical issues and offer referrals to geriatric specialists to avoid future problems while conserving financial resources.
- · Provide consumer education and advocacy.
- Act as a liaison to families at a distance, overseeing care and quickly alerting families to problems.

**Dementia...**Is the loss of intellectual functions (such as memory deficit or confusion) which are required for daily living. Many conditions cause or mimic dementia, including depression, tumors, drug reactions, nutritional deficiencies and degenerative physiological diseases. Geriatric assessment can help determine cause and suggest treatment that can improve or reverse behavior patterns.

## Transient Crimes and Elder Fraud What *You* Need to Know

Most crimes committed against older adults are "transient crimes", many involving home repairs or diversions where a person requests to come into the home to use the bathroom, ask for a drink of water, or to "check out" an unreported problem.

## Older adults are especially vulnerable to be victims of transient crimes because they:

- Live alone and are eager to socialize.
- Know that they can't make needed repairs and fear losing independence, thinking that family members will believe that they are unable to maintain their own home.
- Are eager to please and be helpful.
- Have money at home and in the bank.
- May have declining eyesight, hearing or memory which hinders understanding and identification for prosecution.
- May be susceptible to intimidation and influence.

#### **BE AWARE**

- No matter how good it sounds, you really can't get something for nothing or get a "deal" that's too good to pass up.
- Do not allow ANY stranger into your home. No exceptions. Bathrooms and water are usually just a few short blocks away – a stranger does not need yours.
- All gas, water, electric and cable workers have ID badges and would never ask to "check your system" to gain entry, offer to "correct" a problem or a cash refund.
- Do not sign any contract or use any service offered by a person that approaches you cold by phone or especially "door to door."
- Get all work contracts in writing with firm quotes and detailed description of the work to be performed, wait at least three days until the work begins and if you have any questions at all, talk it over with someone you trust.

Be on the alert for findings of non-existent "damage", failure to perform work and extortion for higher payment after the job is completed.



To apply: You should apply 3 months before you want benefits to begin. You can file over the Internet, over the telephone or at an office. Call to schedule an appointment. You must provide, bank routing number and account number for direct deposit. All documents will be returned.

Medicare is a federal health insurance program for people age 65+ as well as certain disabled individuals. There are two parts to Medicare. Part A is hospital insurance, which helps pay for care in a hospital and skilled nursing facility, home health care and hospice care. Part B is medical insurance, the outpatient arm of Medicare, which helps pay for doctors, outpatient hospital care and other medical services. Part D is the Medicare Prescription Drug Program. Most people do not have to pay for Medicare Part A. Part B is optional with a 2019 premium of \$135.50. Income over \$85,000 single/\$170,000 married can result in higher premiums. If you do not want Part B you must decline it. Otherwise the premium will be automatically deducted from your monthly check. If you are not covered under an employer health insurance plan at age 65, you should

enroll in Part B during a 7-month enrollment period. If you delay enrolling and are not covered by an employer health insurance plan, you will pay a 10 percent penalty on your premium for every year you delayed enrolling in Part B.

Survivors Benefits are payable to qualified widow(er)s and dependent children of a worker who died and is insured for Social Security benefits. Survivors benefits are intended to replace, in part, income that is lost due to the worker's death. Widow(er)s may receive survivors benefits as early as age 60, or age 50 if they are disabled and unable to do substantial work. Under certain conditions, divorced widow(er)s may be entitled to benefits on a divorced spouse's record if they were married at last 10 years. Social Security may pay a lump sum death benefit to a surviving spouse or dependent child(ren) of a deceased worker.

**Disability Benefits** are payable to workers who are unable to do substantial work because of a physical and/or mental condition that is expected to last at least a year or lead to the worker's death. A worker must be insured for disability benefits; for most workers, that means they have worked 5 of the last 10 years. Family members may also qualify for benefits on the disabled worker's record. The average disability benefit in 2018 was \$1,180/ month. The maximum disability benefit in 2018 was \$2,788/month.

Retirement Benefits are payable to workers who are at least 62 and have earned the 40 credits needed to be insured for benefits. The retired worker's spouse, minor children and disabled children who became disabled before age 22 may also be eligible for benefits on the worker's record. A worker may earn up to 4 credits a year, so he or she needs at least 10 years of part-time work to be insured for retirement benefits. Work credits have nothing to do with the monthly benefit amount. Benefits are calculated based on the worker's 35 years of highest earnings indexed for inflation. If you choose to retire before full retirement age (65-67, depending on the year you were born), you will receive permanently reduced monthly benefits. The closer you are to full retirement age, the higher your benefit will be. Workers who postpone collecting benefits past full retirement age may earn delayed retirement credits up until age 70 and boost their monthly benefit amount. The average Social Security retirement benefit as of January, 2019 is \$1,461/month (the amount changes monthly).

Full retirement age is 67 if born after 1959.

Limitations are imposed on wages, self-employment income and some pension income. A person earning more than the wage limitation receives reduced Social Security income.

Below Full Retirement Age Annual Income Limit: \$17,640 For every \$2 earned above the limit, \$1 will be withheld from Social Security payment.

In the Year You Turn Full Retirement Age: Limit is \$46,920 \$1 in benefits are deducted for every \$3 you earn over \$46,920 before the month you reach full retirement. Beginning with full retirement birth month, earnings no longer limit benefits.

FULL RETIREMENT AGE ANNUAL INCOME LIMIT: NONE (WAGES ONLY)

## **SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY (SSI)**

SSI is a federal program which makes monthly payments to disabled or aged (age 65+) individuals who have limited income and resources. To be eligible a person cannot have over \$2000 in assets and a couple over \$3000, excluding the home and, in most instances, one car. A Social Security representative must help determine eligibility. The SSI maximum monthly check amounts are \$711 (single) and \$1,157 (couple) in 2019. Benefit amounts may be adjusted each year.

automatically enrolled effective the month you are 65. Your Medicare card will be mailed to you prior to your 65th birthday if you are already receiving a Social Security benefit. If you do not want Medicare Part B, which is optional, follow the instructions that come with the card.

If you are nearing age 65 and not yet getting Social Security or Medicare, you can apply for both at the same time. To make sure that your Medicare Part B coverage start date is not delayed, you should apply three months before the month you turn 65. This is the beginning of your 7 month Initial Enrollment Period. To apply, you can call or visit your local Social Security office, call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 or apply over the Internet at www.socialsecurity.gov if you meet certain rules.

If you do not receive Social Security benefits and you only want to apply for Medicare because you are nearing 65, you can apply by visiting your local Social Security office, or by calling Social Security at 1-800-772-1213. You should apply 3 months before the month you turn 65. This is the beginning of your 7 month Initial Enrollment Period.

#### Part A: Hospital Insurance

Covers the first 60 days of semi-private hospital care and up to 100 days of post-hospital skilled rehabilitative care in a hospital or skilled nursing facility (nursing home). Coverage of skilled nursing home care requires three consecutive midnights of admitted hospital care. There is a difference between being in the hospital and being admitted. Benefit period begins with day one of hospitalization and ends after you have been out of a hospital or not used skilled nursing care for 60 consecutive days.

#### Part B: Medical Insurance

Pays doctor bills, many preventative services, outpatient care, home health care, ambulance, lab and therapies for eligible Social Security recipients who agree to pay the monthly premium. This fee is deducted from their Social Security check.

#### Part B: Approved Amount

Medicare, not you or your doctor, makes the decision of an approved amount for each specific medical service. The doctor must be certified by Medicare. Medicare will only pay 80% of the approved amount which may be less than the fee you're charged. You must pay 20% of the approved amount.

## Part D: Prescription Drug Plan

See Page 77 for an overview of the plan. Plan Considerations:

- All plans have a different cost structure!

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#### Assignment

Medical providers who accept Medicare payments are required to accept the Medicare approved amount for service or supplies. They may not charge you more than the deductible and 20% coinsurance. Example: You go to a doctor who accepts Medicare and you have already paid the \$161 deductible. The Medicare approved amount for the service you receive is \$200. Medicare would pay 80%, or \$160. You are responsible for no more than the remaining 20%, or \$40.

## BENEFITS THROUGH A MEDICARE HMO, PPO, PFFS

The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) pays a Medicare Advantage Plan to offer Medicare benefits to its members. Plans may charge monthly fees plus co-payment charges. These plans offer comprehensive medical care including routine checkups and may offer other benefits not covered by original Medicare such as dental care. Emphasis is on preventive medical care and care coordination. You may be required to use the plan's doctors and facilities. When you are outside the service area, you have access to all Medicare certified providers for urgent and emergency care. You can join a plan that serves your county, regardless of your health, unless you have been determined to have end-stage renal disease. If you join a Medicare Advantage Plan, you retain all the rights enjoyed by people with Original Medicare.

## **MEDICARE CLAIMS ASSISTANCE**

Hospitals will process claim forms for you through their senior membership programs if you have bills connected with their hospital or physicians. Many home health care agencies also process claim forms for their services. Small businesses that specialize in this can be found in the Yellow Pages under Insurance Claims Processing and Medical Claims Processing.

## **COMMUNITY MEDICAID**

#### Home and Community Based Medicaid

Application for Medicaid must be made with your county's Department of Job and Family Services. Some counties have offices in more than one location. Medicaid is a joint federal/state assistance program for people who cannot afford to pay for medical care. The aged, blind, or disabled may qualify for Community Medicaid. Financial criteria including income and assets also apply. Community Medicaid coverage includes prescriptions, doctor visits, limited dental and vision care. Other procedures/equipment may need prior authorization by the Medicaid insurance office. Always check with your doctor to make sure services are covered.

Eligibility requirements for Institutional Medicaid (residents in nursing facilities) and Home and Community-Based Medicaid Waiver programs are different than Community Medicaid. Please contact the Dept. of Job and Family services in your county for more information.

## © 2019 Part D - Prescription Drug Coverage

All people with Medicare are able to enroll in plans that cover prescription drugs. Plans vary based on income, but in general, this is how they work:

- ✓ Keep in mind that all plans have a different cost structure, and late enrollees may incur a 1% penalty for each month of delay.
- ☑ Annual Deductible You pay 100% of drug costs until your deductible is met (\$0 - \$415 in 2019).
- ☑ Basic monthly premiums, \$33.19 (extended coverage may cost more).
- ✓ Initial Coverage Coverage and cost sharing begins until you meet the Initial Coverage limit (\$3,820 in 2019 - this is what you and your plan pay combined).
- ✓ Coverage Gap When your total drug costs exceed \$3,820, your cost-sharing is 25% of covered brand name drugs and 37% of covered generics. Previously, the coverage gap or, "donut hole" was so called because you had to pay 100% of your drug costs. The discount subsidy will gradually increase over the the next several years until the donut hole is eliminated in 2020.
- ✓ Catastrophic Coverage Catastrophic coverage begins when you reach the out-of-pocket threshold. Beneficiaries will then pay a small amount (about 5%) for covered brands. Your plan will pick up the remainder during this phase.
- ☑ Those with limited incomes/resources may qualify for extra help (Limited Income Subsidy LIS) through the Social Security Administration.

## **Patient Assistance Programs (PAPs)**

PAPs are programs offered by drug companies that provide medications FREE to those who qualify.

· Eligibility criteria vary with each program.

- Medicare beneficiaries MAY be eligible for PAPs while in the Part D coverage gap.
- Most PAPs do not assist consumers who have government benefits such as Medicaid, or those with private insurance.
- To apply, consumers need to know which companies manufacture their medications.

## **Long Term Care Insurance**

Most people begin paying for nursing home care from savings and assets, which can be quickly used up. Once a person has become basically impoverished, (see Medicaid eligibility requirements) the Medicaid federal/state government-funded insurance program pays for care. Anyone with substantial assets to protect, in addition to a house, in the event of illness, should research long term care insurance.

## **COMPANY CHECKLIST**

- How long has the company been in the long term care business? A good company should have been in business at least a couple years. Don't be taken in by low premiums to attract customers.
- ☑ Research the company's financial strength. A.M. Best is an industry-respected independent rating firm. A+ Superior or A Excellent is okay. Stay away from any rating below A. Ask your agent for a copy.
- ✓ Watch out for quick 2-3 day turnaround time for policy approval. Expect a four week turnaround for approval.
- ✓ What is the company's claim paying record? Know the percentage of claims paid by the company. If new, excessive claims may raise rates in future years.

## TAKE NOTE

You need three documents to help protect your wishes or to assume responsible caregiving for a loved one — a general durable power of attorney (for financial and legal matters), a living will and a durable power of attorney for health care. Some medical authorities may be reluctant to follow a patient's living will orders.

It's important to tell your doctor, executor, guardian, family and close friends where they are located. Make sure all copies are signed and notarized.

- ✓ How has the company treated current policyholders when they update? Have enhancements been written on a guaranteed basis, for additional cost or has medical requalification been required?
- ✓ Make sure the company performs medical underwriting at the time of application rather than at claim time.

#### **POLICY CHECKLIST**

- ✓ Is the policy tax qualified? You may get a tax break and better protection.
- Make sure the policy has a guaranteed renewable clause so you can't be cancelled or singled out for rate increases.
- Check for inflation protection—5% of daily benefit compounded annually. This type of inflation option has level premiums which is important because premiums increase with age.
- Check to assure that the waiver of premium applies to <u>both</u> nursing home and home health care. This continues to cover you at no cost while collecting benefits.
- ☑ A good policy does not require you to be hospitalized before benefits are payable. The need for nursing home care and/or home health care may differ from the reason for hospitalization.
- ✓ Look for policies that cover home health carefully. Most long term nursing care is provided inside the home.
- All levels of nursing care should be covered: skilled, intermediate and custodial. How are they defined? What are the Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) that the company uses? How are they defined and how many must be lost to trigger benefits?

- ✓ What is the length of the benefit period? Does the policy allow you to use your nursing home benefits in the home when home health care benefits are exhausted and vice versa?
- ✓ What is the deductible or waiting period? This can range from 0 to 365 days. It should be one that fits your budget since most people begin paying for nursing home care from savings and assets.

#### **TERMS**

#### **Activities of Daily Living**

Activities necessary to maintain independent living. May include bathing, grooming, dressing, toileting, transferring and eating.

#### **Custodial/Personal Care**

Provides personal, non-medical help with the activities of daily living such as dressing, bathing, eating and other routine activities.

## **Elimination Period and Exclusion**

Refers to the waiting period of the policy; the initial number of days before benefits are paid. Any condition or expense not paid for by a policy.

#### **Guaranteed Renewable**

This means a policy cannot be cancelled unless you fail to pay premiums when they are due. Premiums cannot be raised unless there is a rate increase for all policy holders in a particular group.

#### **Medicare Certified**

Long term care policies require that care be Medicare certified to qualify for benefits. This means a doctor's order for care must be issued.

#### **Pre-existing Conditions**

Medical conditions that existed, were diagnosed or were under treatment prior to the issuance of the policy.

## Do You Need Medigap or MedSup Insurance?

Not if you belong to a Medicare Advantage Plan or are a Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB).

## How Medigap Insurance Can Be Sold

Ten standard policies, plans A, B, C, D, F, G, K, L, M and N may be sold in Ohio in 2019. They may be sold under different names by different companies, so always ask what letter plan you are considering. The most popular plan is Plan C. Once you have selected a plan that is suitable for you, check the premium various companies charge. The plans are regulated and the coverage for a given plan is the same for all companies selling that plan regardless of differences in premiums.

#### All companies must offer Plan A – Basic Benefits:

- Part A and Part B Deductibles must be met first.
- Includes 100% Part B coinsurance
- Basic Part A coinsurance + 365 days
- · Hospice Coverage Part A coinsurance
- Blood first 3 pints/year

- ✓ What are the policy exclusion limits for covered services?

**Take Note:** It may be a good idea to keep your Medigap policy for a few months if you purchase a Medicare Advantage plan. This allows you time to decide if the Advantage plan is to your liking.

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## **Hospital Health Care Systems**

Hospitals provide a wide range of services including emergency assistance, health screening and monitoring programs, rehabilitation, home health care and aides, physician referral and family and pastoral counseling.

The term "health care system" is used to encompass the wide range of places/systems that are currently available. Examples of health care systems include neighborhood locations, mobile units, specific disease assessment and treatment centers, as well as hospital ownership of home health agencies, hospices, medical equipment providers and continuing care living facilities.

## **Hospital Financial Assistance Programs**

If you need medical care provided in a hospital setting but are unable to pay for it, you may be eligible for free or reduced fee care at local hospitals through the Hospital Care Assistance Program (HCAP). To be eligible for HCAP you must be an Ohio resident and cannot be a recipient of Medicaid. Eligibility for HCAP is also based on Federal Poverty Guidelines. Individual hospitals may also have their own financial assistance programs with different rules and procedures. HCAP and other hospital assistance programs cover hospital charges only and do not assist with other provider charges. Patients can apply for HCAP prior to a needed hospital procedure/admission. Patients can also apply up to 3 years after they are notified about HCAP (even if the bill has been sent to collections). To apply for financial assistance with hospital charges contact the hospital's patient financial services department.







## **Home Health Care**

See Glossary of Terms

### Selecting an Agency

This is a personal decision that must be made based upon your needs. Senior centers, hospital discharge planners or social service workers, physicians, United Way agencies, religious and senior citizens groups can all help.

## **RANGE OF SERVICES**

Many agencies provide free assessments to determine the most cost effective plan of care. Per visit or hourly rates vary by agency and also depend on the skill level, acuity of care, length and timing of services needed.

#### **Medicare Coverage Guidelines**

Qualifying for home health benefits under Medicare is never guaranteed. Minimally, the patient must be:

- Homebound,
- Under the care of an M.D. who requests skilled care
- In need of skilled nursing or physical therapy services on an intermittent basis. (A patient who requires more than intermittent care, but refuses alternatives, is not eligible.)

#### **Examples of Medicare covered skilled nursing services:**

- wound dressing involving prescription drug and aseptic technique
- · bladder and bowel training in the case of incontinence
- · colostomy or ileostomy care
- · injections
- · respiratory, physical, speech or occupational therapies

Medicare does not cover any private duty nursing costs. A patient may be frail and require support services such as enemas, incontinence care, bathing, personal grooming, ambulatory assistance, transfer from bed to chair, prompting for performance of basic activities of daily living (ADLs), meal preparation and feeding, dressing, homemaking, chore and companion services. Medicare will not pay if the guidelines listed above are not met.





#### **MEDICAL EMERGENCY RESPONSE SYSTEMS**

These systems allow a person to wear a remote button around the neck or wrist and summon help 24 hrs a day. In voice or non-voice activated units, an alert goes out to a response center which tries to contact the subscriber, then pre-designated persons if necessary. Some systems have a timer option where, if the person does not reset a button every 24 hours, an alert is sent to the response center.

## Doctor Visit Checklist

Most people forget what they want to ask their doctor, or they think their doctor is too busy to spend extra time with them. Remember, this is scheduled time with the doctor. You're entitled to answers to your questions. In order to make the most of your visit to the doctor, it's important to be prepared. Use this helpful checklist to prepare for your next visit.

#### Prior to a Doctor Visit (take this with you):

- 1. Write down your questions.
- 2. Write down changes in your symptoms or condition.
- 3. Take a copy of your prescription formulary list you can find it in your insurance company enrollment packet or at your insurance carrier's website.
- 4. Write down alternative treatments or medications that you'd like to discuss with your physician.
- 5. Make a list of the current medications you're taking (over the counter and prescriptions).
- 6. Other:

## **During Your Doctor Visit:**

- If your doctor prescribes a name brand medication, ask about a generic. Doing so may help you save on out-of-pocket costs.
- Ask if the prescribed medication is on your formulary list (give your doctor a copy). Using medications on the list can help you save on outof-pocket costs. Visit your insurance carrier's website to print out a copy of the formulary list.
- 3. Ask your doctor for samples of the medication he/she prescribed. This way you can try the medication for a few days to see if it's effective for you. If it is, then you can fill your doctor's prescription; if not, it hasn't cost you anything.
- 4. Be sure to review the list of symptoms, questions and medications that you've prepared.
- When appropriate, talk to your doctor about other treatment options. Make sure you're well informed. Discuss which treatment would be most beneficial and cost-effective for you.

## **Hospice Care**

Hospice is an option when a patient is determined to have a life-limiting illness that is no longer responding to treatment or the patient has decided to forgo any further treatment for their illness. Hospice then provides care at the end of life- treating symptoms like pain, shortness of breath and anxiety along with addressing the emotional and spiritual needs of the patient and family. Hospice care is provided by an interdisciplinary team made up of physicians, nurses, hospice aides, social workers, chaplains, bereavement managers and trained volunteers. Hospice care can be provided in a variety of settings: in-home, in hospital or in a nursing home. Hospice is covered by Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurance plans.

Hospice is provided to patients who have reached an end stage to any illness such as stroke, heart, lung, kidney and liver disease, dementia, Parkinson's disease and neurological disorders like ALS.

## **Components of Hospice Care**

- · Offers pain-comforting, not curative treatment
- Treats the person, not the disease
- Emphasizes quality, rather than length of life
- · Considers the entire family, not just the patient
- Help and support to patient and family on a 24-hr. basis

Hospice services are provided by a team of trained professionals including physicians, nurses, counselors, clergy, social workers, therapists, aides and volunteers. Not all hospice providers can give the same level of care in the home setting. Ask if the hospice provider offers Intensive Comfort Care. This is a level of care offered under the Medicare hospice benefit that enables the patient to remain at home during increased times of symptoms. A patient's home could be their private home, retirement community, assisted living facility or nursing home. With Intensive Comfort Care - i.e., Continuous Care - there can be up to 24 hour care provided (but at least 8 hours during a 24 hour period) at the bedside until the symptoms are improved. This eliminates the need for the patient to leave their home and go into an inpatient unit for this treatment.




## PEOPLE FIRST LANGUAGE

No one "suffers from," or "is afflicted with" or is a "victim of" anything! Nor is anyone "wheelchair-bound." There are people who USE wheelchairs. Their wheelchairs allow them the freedom to go where they want to go! People First Language to use…

- People with intellectual disabilities or he has a cognitive disability

- She has Down Syndrome
- He is a person with a seizure disorder
- · He uses a wheelchair
- She has a developmental disability
- He has no speech

- Typical instead of "normal"









# **Reverse Mortgage Loans**

Reverse mortgage loans enable persons age 62+ to get cash (a loan) that is not paid back until you move out of your home, no matter how long that turns out to be. This loan relies only on home equity, so advanced age, low income, and even bad credit (except debt to the Federal Government), does not prevent this loan from going through.

The most popular form of Reverse Mortgage is the Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM) which is the one described here. The HECM loan is done through private lenders who compete for your business, but these loans are backed 100% by the Federal Government through the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

#### **How Much Can I Borrow?**

The following chart gives examples of the amount of money available at an interest rate of 3.97%. The interest rate in the discussion here is variable monthly (a slightly higher, variable yearly rate is also offered); the lower the interest rate, the more money that is available to the homeowner.

There are several choices for taking the money available; a line of credit, a monthly payment for life ("tenure") for a specified period, or any combination of these methods. Notice that the older you are, the greater the amount available.

#### PROS AND CONS OF REVERSE MORTGAGES

#### **Pros Include:**

- A free educational session conducted by a trained counselor is required before you enroll with a lender.
- · No monthly mortgage payments.
- A "low" interest rate applies and accumulates only on the funds borrowed so far.
- No repayment until you move; for co-owners, no repayment until you both move.
- Existing mortgages will be paid off with Reverse Mortgage Funds (as long as there are enough proceeds to do so).

 If you are receiving public benefits (such as SSI or Food Stamps), Reverse Mortgage proceeds can be managed in a way that does not interfere with benefits.

#### Cons Include:

- High start-up costs. While these are not paid out of pocket, there is an immediate debt on the home. So this loan is costly if you move out of the home soon.
- Required repairs must be less than 15% of the home value (if repair needs are greater, other programs may help - ask your counselor).
- Any existing mortgage must be paid off, so if existing debt is too large, the Reverse Mortgage might not provide enough money to do so.

#### **CAREGIVER TIPS**

- More than half of the seniors who apply for reverse mortgages are eligible for Supplemental Social Security. Income received from reverse mortgages does not affect Social Security or Medicare. Since these payments are considered a loan, they do not affect Medicaid or Passport eligibility requirements.
- The cost to obtain a reverse mortgage is greater than forward loans. For the very elderly who wish to remain in their home, and need the funds to do so, the additional cost may be worthwhile.

# **Nursing Facilities/Nursing Homes**

See Glossary of Terms

Nursing facilities are not necessarily the "last step" for patients. If someone requires constant supervision and there is no one to provide this care, nursing facilities can provide temporary respite and support. There are many home health care and assisted living alternatives. A person does not necessarily need to move into a nursing facility simply because he or she is having health problems or cannot manage to live independently at home. The options depend upon the duration and type of services required as well as the level of care that can be afforded. Nursing facilities may be owned and operated by a philanthropic or non-profit organization such as a church or religious organization or a proprietary, forprofit corporation, family or individual. Philanthropic nursing facilities are not necessarily less expensive than proprietary nursing facilities. Many facilities have waiting lists, especially for Medicare beds.

Family members may feel frustrated or guilty about not being able to personally care for a parent or other loved one. Nursing home administrators, religious and health care professionals, and the Long Term Care Ombudsman can provide helpful perspectives.

## If Nursing Home Placement is the Appropriate

Option you will need a Universal Pre-Admission Review (UPAR). This is a state required service for anyone who is entering a Medicaid certified nursing facility and provides an assessment and offers information about options for the most appropriate long term care. For more information call PASSPORT at 1-800-589-7277. To make the transition most effective, a prospective resident, the family and physician may be involved in the decision making process.

- Encourage as much independent decision making as possible by the prospective resident.
- · Move as many personal effects as possible into the room to foster familiarity and comfort.
- · Assure the person that a family member is always reachable by phone.

#### FINANCIAL AND LEGAL PRE-PLANNING

#### **Long Term Care Insurance**

Many people begin paying for nursing home care from savings and assets which can quickly be used up. Once a person becomes impoverished, (see Medicaid eligibility requirements), Medicaid pays for care. A spouse with assets of \$150,000 to protect (excluding the house, one car and wedding rings), should research long term care insurance. Monthly premium costs are based on age and benefit coverage, benefit amount and waiting period (like a deductible). Monthly premium payments may be included as part of your tax deductible medical expenses.

#### **Medicaid Estate Planning**

There are many complex financial and legal decisions to be made for nursing home placement, and pre-planning is critical. Annual nursing home costs average \$80,000. Families usually begin paying for nursing home care from savings. Medicare coverage of nursing home care is extremely limited. Most people deplete their savings and rely on government-funded Medicaid insurance. You should consult an attorney for Medicaid estate planning. To prevent impoverishment, planning can be done five years in advance of nursing home placement. In limited situations, planning can be done sooner than five years, but the further in advance the planning is done, the better. Medicaid may not pay for nursing home care if transfers are made within 60 months of applying for benefits.

## **Requirements for Medicaid Coverage**

- · Assets are split between the couple.
- A spouse in the community may keep between \$25,282 \$126,420, depending on their specific situation. If both spouses are in a nursing home and both applying for Medicaid, each spouse must have less than \$2,000 of countable assets.
- A single resident's countable assets cannot exceed \$2.000.
- A resident's total gross monthly income from all sources must be less than the Special Income Level (\$2,313 in 2019) or a Qualified Income Trust must be established.

Some nursing homes do not provide care for residents who rely on Medicaid. You should contact the facility to ensure they accept Medicaid before your loved one is admitted.

#### **CAREGIVER TIP**

Some nursing home residents have frail bodies but very alert minds. Others may not be able to process numbers to play bingo, but enjoy trips out to a park, or to see holiday decorations. Study the activities schedule to make sure your loved one will have access to the types if activities he or she will enjoy and look forward to.

#### **MEDICARE COVERAGE**

Medicare reimbursement for any one service is never guaranteed. Services listed are usually covered by Medicare. Applicable only in Medicare certified nursing facilities. Pays any costs over \$167.50 per day for days 21–100 per benefit period if patient:

- · Has been admitted for at least three consecutive nights.
- · Has been admitted for skilled nursing care for a condition treated in the hospital.
- Is admitted within 30 days of leaving hospital.
- Has doctor's authorization.

Also pays up to 210 days of hospice care for terminally ill.

#### **Medicare Helps Pay for:**

(Providers must be Medicare certified.)

- · Medical social services.
- · Bed in semi-private room (two-four beds per room) and all meals including special diets.

#### Do's and Don'ts of 911

Dial 911 only for an emergency. Emergencies include a serious medical problem, fire, any lifethreatening situation or if you see a crime in progress. If you must call 911, speak calmly and clearly:

- · Describe the type of incident you are reporting
- · Describe your location and the emergency location
- · Provide a description of those involved in incident
- · Do not hang up until the dispatcher tells you to
- · Follow any instructions the dispatcher gives you
- · Secure pets that may interfere with responders
- · Gather any medications a person may be taking

Do not dial 911 for a non-emergency. Take the time now to find the numbers you might need to call in the event of a non-emergency.

#### **TAKE NOTE**

If you receive Medicare benefits through a Medicare Advantage Plan, you do not need Medigap insurance. You may wish to maintain your Medigap policy until you are sure you are satisfied with a plan's services.

- Necessary nursing services.
- Drugs, medical supplies, appliances and equipment (wheelchairs, crutches and braces).
- Doctor's services (if you have Part B coverage).

#### **Medicare Does Not Help Pay for:**

- · Personal comfort or convenience items such as phone, radio or television furnished at the patient's request.
- · Private duty nursing.
- · An extra charge for use of a private room, unless the patient needs it for medical reasons and the doctor orders it.

#### **MEDICAID COVERAGE**

Applicable in Medicaid certified nursing facilities. Pays if local Human Svcs. dept. decides nursing care medically necessary and patient meets eligibility requirements.

Medicaid Will Pay: (Provider must be Medicaid certified.)

- · Skilled nursing and laundry services.
- · Semi-private room, meals and special diets if prescribed by doctor.
- Drugs and medical supplies.
- · Physician ordered "restorative" services such as physical, occupational, hearing and speech therapy and diagnostic evaluation visits.
- Some transport to and from hospital and nursing home.
- A bed for 30 days for therapeutic visits or hospital stays. During the 31st day, patient must privately pay to hold bed or go back on the Medicaid waiting list.

#### **Medicaid Will Not Pay for:**

- · Private duty nursing.
- · Rest home care or custodial care.
- Personal comfort or convenience items, unless medically necessary and ordered by the doctor.
- · Non-essential or experimental services.
- Beauty/barber shop services.
- · Dry cleaning.
- Transportation costs to visit families and friends.
- · Continued stay in a facility if the resident's level of care does not match the facility's certification level (if alternate placement available).

#### TAKE NOTE

You need an attorney for Medicaid estate planning. To prevent impoverishment, trusts must be set up five years in advance of nursing home placement. Medicaid will not pay nursing home bills for 60 months after assets are transferred. This can cause significant financial hardship for a community spouse.




